Goals: The end result of most use cases. A successful diagram should describe the activities and variants used to reach the goal.

Use case diagram symbols and notation

The notation for a use case diagram is pretty straightforward and doesn't involve as many types of symbols as other UML diagrams.

- **Use cases:** Horizontally shaped ovals that represent the different uses that a user might have.
- **Actors:** Stick figures that represent the people actually employing the use cases.
- **Associations:** A line between actors and use cases. In complex diagrams, it is important to know which actors are associated with which use cases.
- **System boundary boxes:** A box that sets a system scope to use cases. All use cases outside the box would be considered outside the scope of that system. For example, Psycho Killer is outside the scope of occupations in the chainsaw example found below.
- **Packages:** A UML shape that allows you to put different elements into groups. Just as with component diagrams, these groupings are represented as file folders.

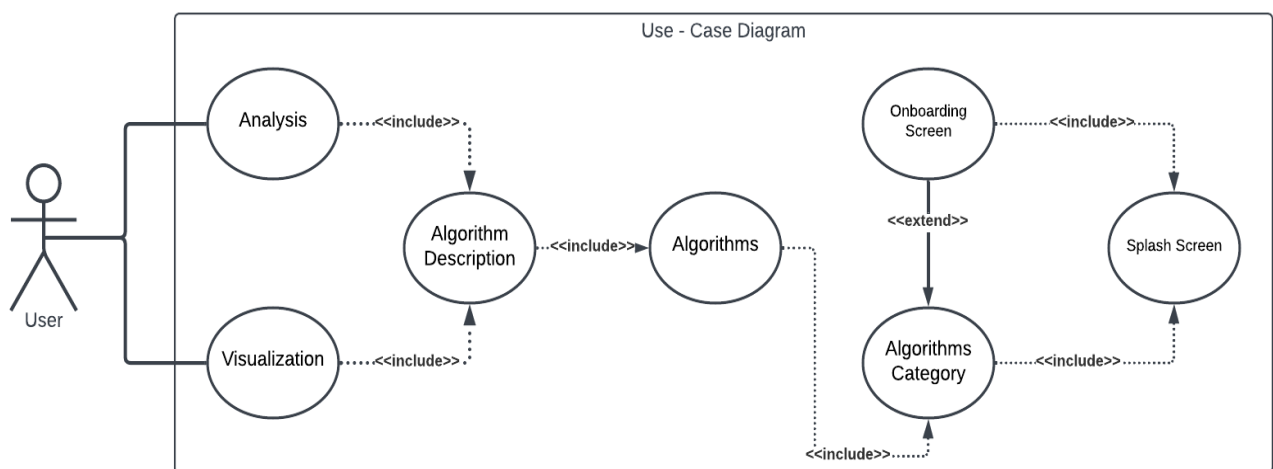


Figure 3.1: Use-Case Diagram

3.2.3. Activity Diagram

An activity diagram is a type of behavioral diagram in UML (Unified Modeling Language) used to model the dynamic aspects of a system. It describes the flow of activities and actions that take place within a system and the relationships and interactions between those activities.

An activity diagram is composed of various elements, including:

- **Initial Node:** represents the starting point of the flow of activities.

Activity diagrams are useful for modeling the dynamic behavior of a system, as well as for defining the flow of activities and interactions between activities. They are used in a variety of applications, including business process modeling, software development, and systems engineering.

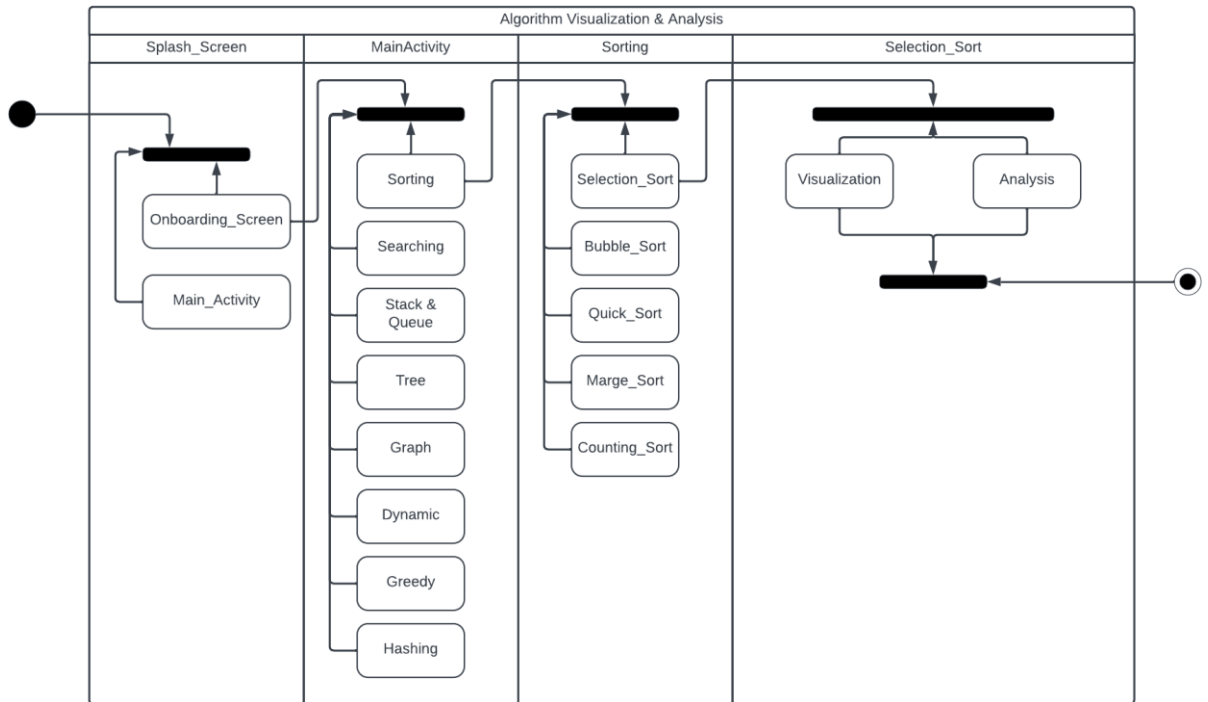


Fig 3.3: Activity Diagram

Algorithm Category (Dashboard): Where All algorithms categories will be shown in the dashboard section. Which types algorithms the user wants to learn will show in the dashboard.

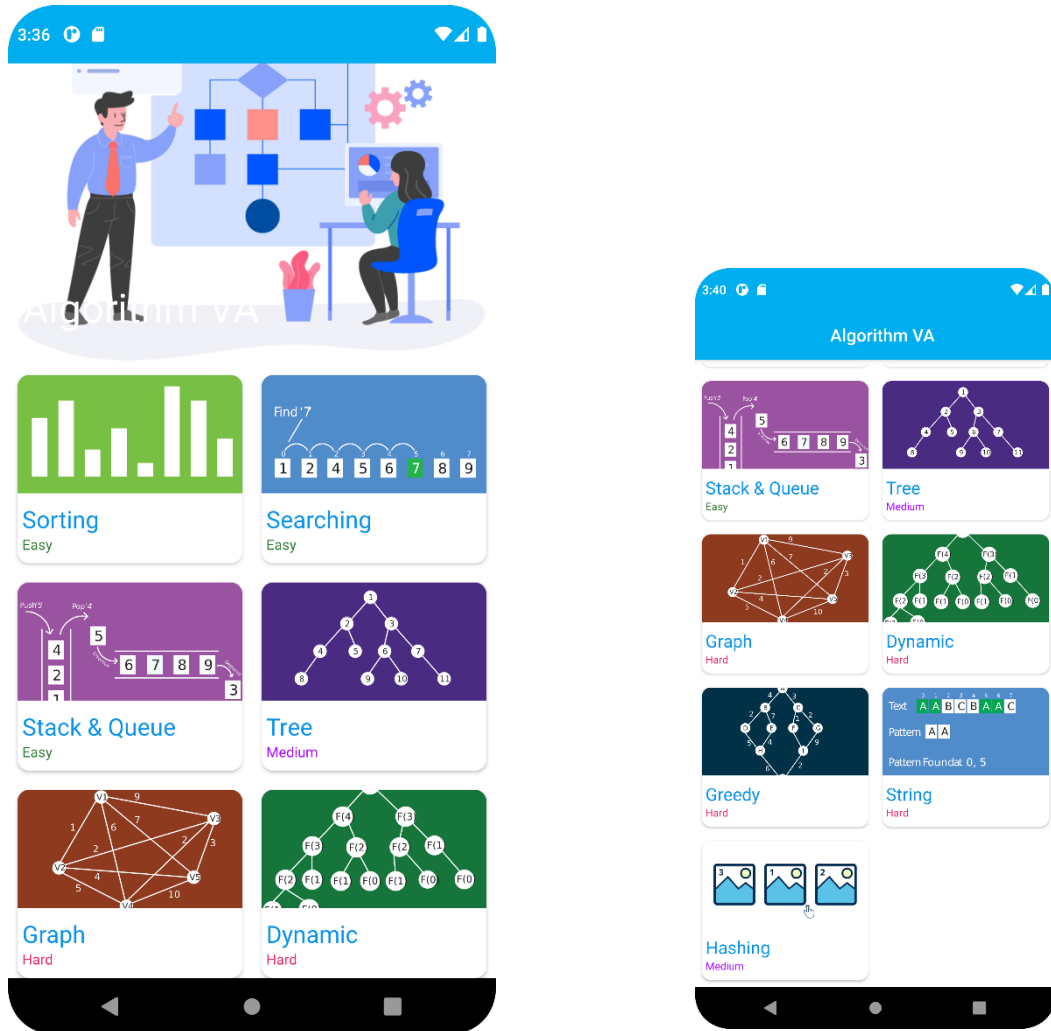


Fig - 4.2: Algorithm Category

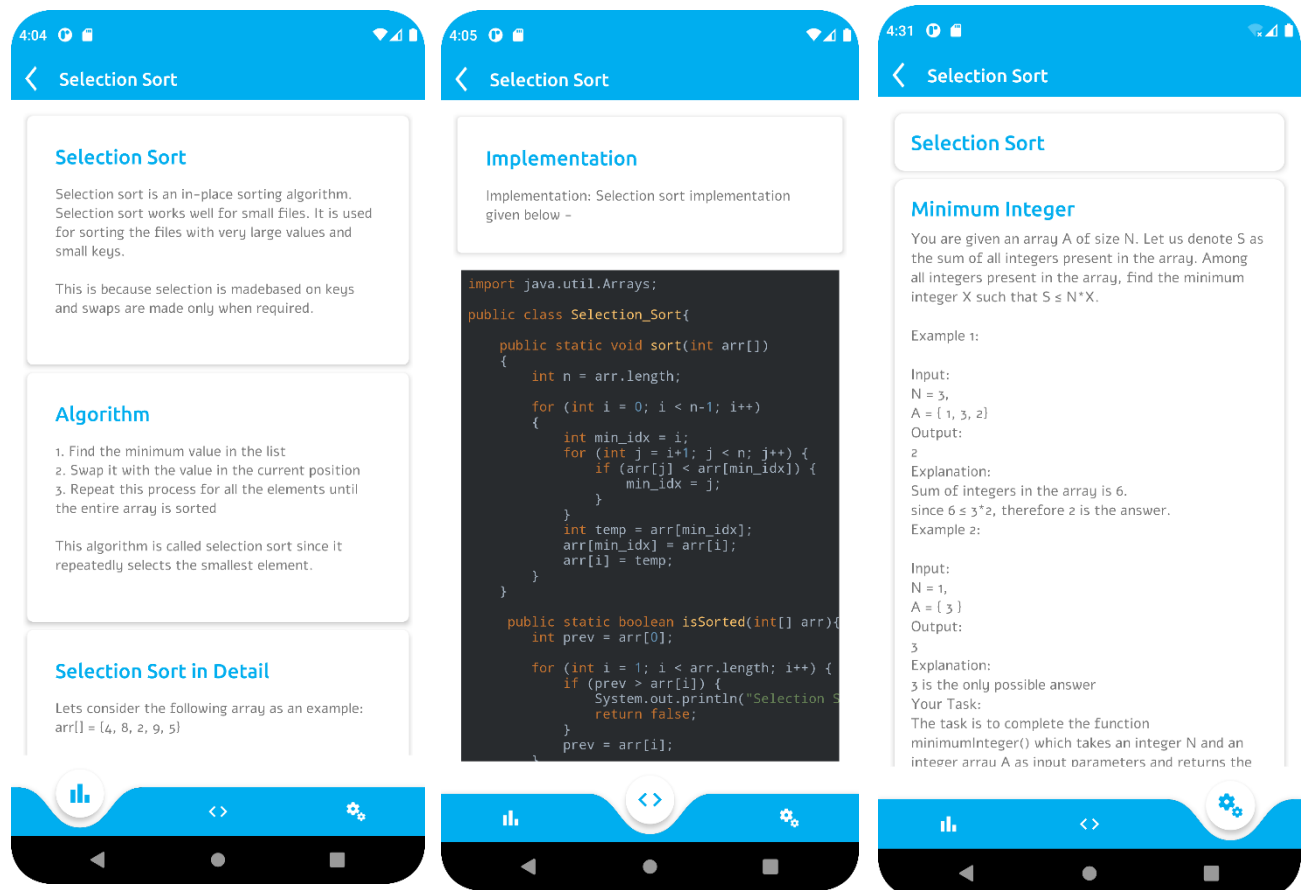


Fig - 4.4: Algorithm Description

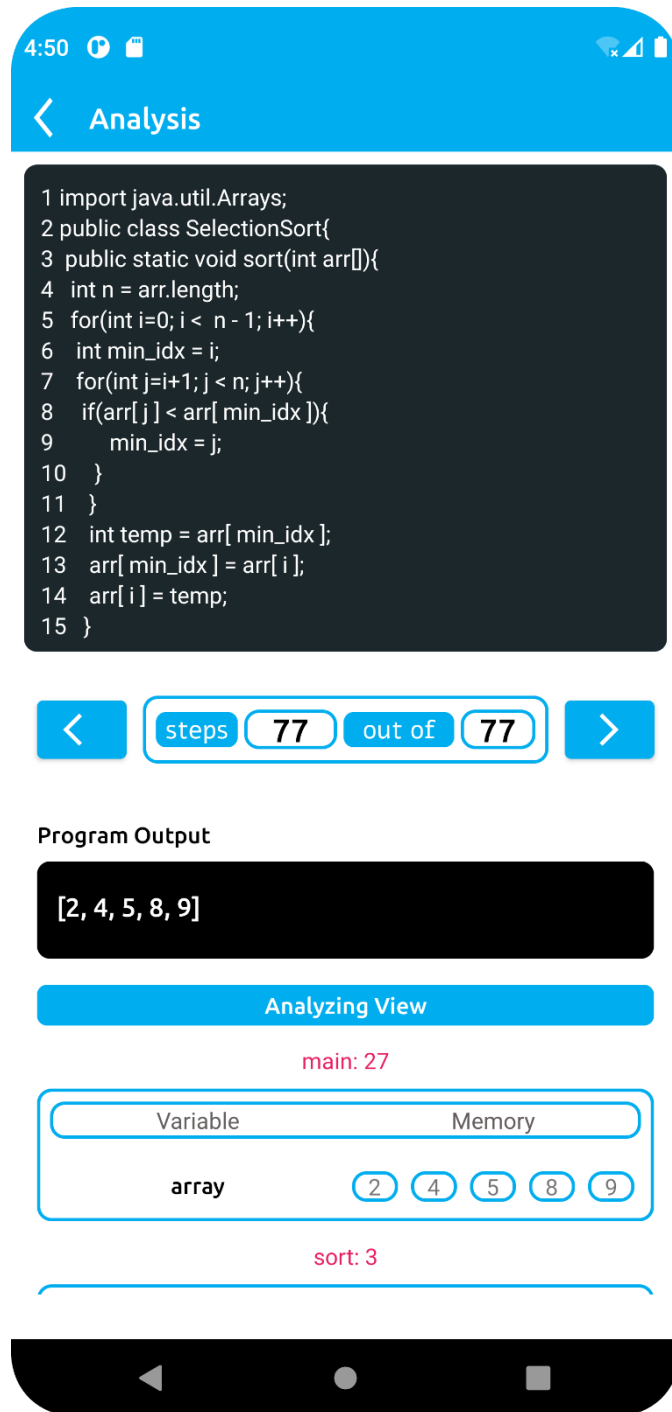


Fig - 4.5: Algorithm Analysis

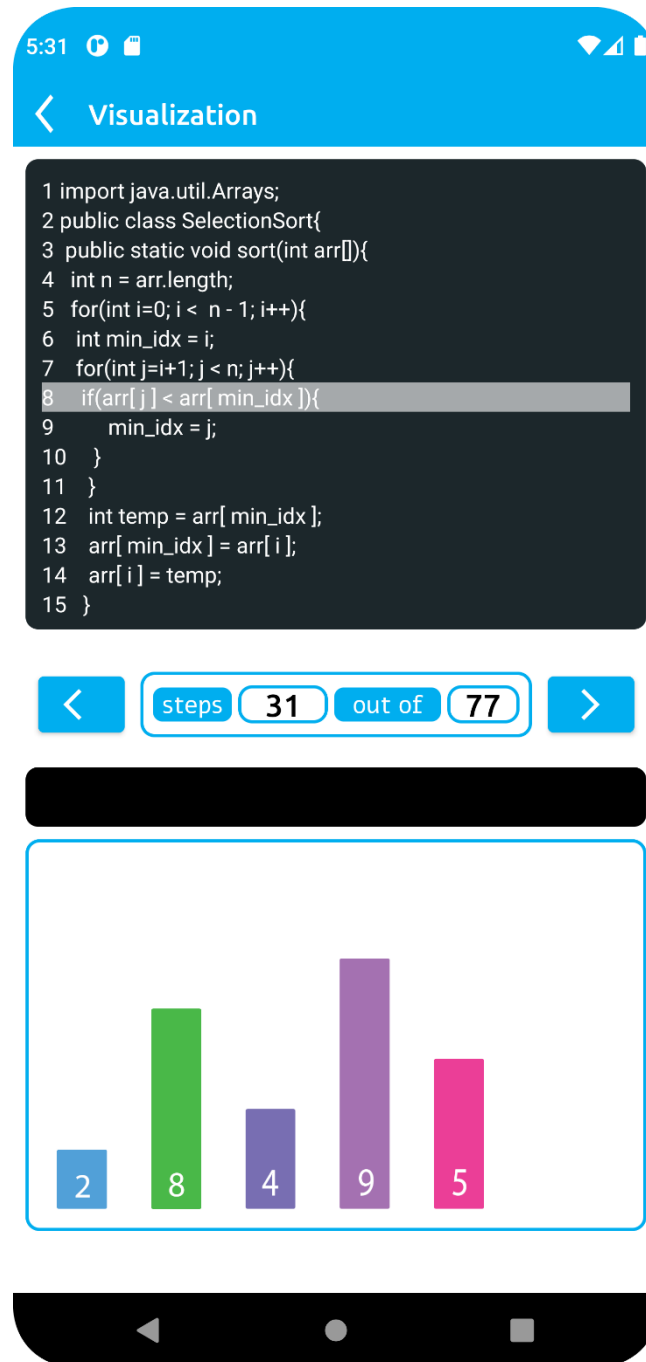


Fig - 4.6: Algorithm Visualization
